Public Land - Pre-Devolution vs. Current




Public Land Act


- Passed by the 18th Legislative Assembly in 2019 but awaits completion of regulations before coming into force
- Combines all the GNWT land administered by the Department of Lands under one authority
- Eliminates legislative division between Commissioner's Land and Territorial Land


Mineral Resources Act Implementation by Julie Ward Director, Mineral Resources Act Implementation

History

- During Devolution in 2014, Northwest Territories Lands Act was created to mirror federal legislation.
- The Mineral Resources Act (MRA) received assent in August 2019, a stand-alone Mineral legislation that enables various new authorities and functions beyond current Mining Regulations.
- Extensive new regulations and business processes are required, under the MRA, for it to come into force.




Collaborative Development of Regulations

- Intergovernmental Council on Land and Resource Management: Legislative Development Protocol (Dec 2020)
- Work with the Intergovernmental Council to collaboratively develop regulations
- Setup a technical working group with IGCS (~March 2021) to work on MRA Regulations
- December 2021 other Indigenous Governments started participating in technical working group







 - made by a co-management Board
 - guided by the requirements of the *Mackenzie Valley Resource Management Act*

Draft Guidelines for Preliminary Screeners

- Recently went through public review
- Public comments will be incorporated into a final draft
- Target release date of early summer 2022

Updates to the Online Review System and website

- Online review system lets people and communities ask questions to developers and tell the Review Board what they think about developments
- Recent updates make the system more user friendly and accessible
- ongoing updates to the website will make information about developments and the EA process easier to find and access



Future planned policy initiatives

- draft *Guidelines for Developers of Major Projects* describes:
 - optional, direct pathway to EA for developers of major projects
 - information requirements for developers who choose to follow this pathway
 - available for public review late spring 2022
- draft Guidelines for Assessing Impacts on People
 - describes the Review Board's approach to considering impacts on people and well-being in environmental assessment
 - incorporates information from social, economic and cultural impact assessment
 - sequenced release for public review to accommodate community concerns

 - Build on work from previous Legislative Assembly
 - Target for Bill introduction February 2023
- ➤ ENR has been working with the Intergovernmental Council Secretariat to develop the Bill, through the *Intergovernmental Council on Land and Resource Management: Legislative Development Protocol*.



Priorities

- Waters Act
 - Build on work from previous Legislative Assembly
- Environmental Protection Act (EPA)
 - Build on work from previous Legislative Assembly

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
